Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund Report, 2020

116-136, 138 Stat. 281 (March 27, 2020), directs institutions receiving funds under Section 18004 of the CARES Act to submit (in a time and manner required by the Secretary) a report to the Secretary describing the use of

attendance such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and child care). On April 9, 2020, the Department published documentation to the Emergency Financial Aid Grants, including a [letter from Secretary Betsy DeVos](#), the [Certification and Agreement form](#) for signing and returning by institutions to access the funds, and a list of [institutional allocations under 18004\(a\)\(1\)](#).

each HEERF participating institution must post the following information on its website:

- 1) An acknowledgement that the institution signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has ~~used~~ <sup>used</sup> for use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid to students.

- 4) The estimated total number of students at the institution participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.
- a) The total enrollment during the Spring 2020 semester is 9,357. Of those students, Stockton University estimates that at least 85% the students are therefore eligible to receive these grants assuming they incurred expenses related to the disruption campus operations due to the coronavirus.

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
