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## New Jersey tea party members prove to be rivals for Republicans

Members of the conservative tea party moven**ner** showed their political colors by carrying banners at protest rallies.

But 18 months after the anti-tax movement's intimes local and New Jersengembers show they are now trying to influence public affairs by moving intronainstream political campaigns and taking on public officials.

The New Jersey branches have already sprinted ahead of the national organizations by launching a court battle to recall U.S. SeRobert Menendez, a Democraiticumbent and the region's highest-profile target.
