Polls differ on Booker's Lead

(Though most politicians would be happy with a 10-point victory.)

The Rutgers poll sees Booker with an even bigger win, though: It said likely voters favor him, 58-36.

"Voters we talked to seem to have moved back in his direction," said David Redlawsk, director of the Rutgers-Eagleton Poll. "The debates presented a stark picture of the differences between the candidates, which appears to have led independents to prefe







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r Booker."

Booker had a 54 percent positive rating, but that was down nine points from Rutgers' early September poll. His unfavorability has grown to 32 percent (from 19 percent), and 34 percent see Booker as mainly concerned with self-promotion.
