## South Jersey congressional races likely to get national attention in 2014

U.S. Rep. Jon Runyan's surprisenouncement that he would not seek re-election all but guarantees South Jersey will be home to two elements closely watched congressional races in the nation next year.

While candidates are scrambling foosition in Runyan's Congressional Distit in Burlington and Ocean counties, at least opnorminent Democrat, Bill Hughest., has already stepped up to take on Republican coumbent U.S. Rep. Frank LoBion drothe sprawling eight-county 2nd District.

Now that South Jersey has finished onetentious election, here comes another one.

"So, we thought we would genaybe a week off," joked Brigitarrison, a Galloway Township resident and Montclair State University of essor of lawand political science.

"I think these will be some of the most active ices in the country, added Sharon Schulman, a political analyst and CEO of exteal affairs for The Richard Staton College of New Jersey.

The nonpartisan Cook Politic Report downgraded LoBiondo's atterom "solidly" to "likely Republican" in mid-October and, tef Runyan's announcement, said seat was a "toss-up." At the same time, the Cook Partisan Voting Index LaBiondo's district leans slightly Democratic, while Runyan's leans slightly Reblican. Runyan is a Republican.

If there are contested primary elections, ads contains rolling out as earlas February, Harrison said. In the 3rd District, Democrats are talking with fee or four" people who kne expressed interest from Ocean and Burlington coties, said Marta Harrison, the cean County Democrats' vice chairwoman. Burlington County €eholder Aimee Belgard on Wheesday became the first to announce she would run.

Third District Republicans seemed anxiouspite vent a repeat of 0208, when a Republican congressman's decision to not run touched diffusising three-way primary that weakened the eventual Republican nominee, Chillsyers, and Democrat John Adler won.

Published reports have listed more than halfed protential GOP candid stewith designs on the 3rd District seat, but Republican lessed have been officially circumspect.

George Gilmore, the longtimenhead of Ocean County Republicassid he anticipated 3rd District Republicans in Ocean and BurlingtCounty would agree to a candidate, but hadn't decided by Friday.

"Right now we're finishing up the election," Gilmore said. "Givene a week and we will be happy to discuss it with you."
