
Revolters want public payrolls reduced

For the first time in almost 40 years, the majority of the voters in New Jersey voted against the proposed school district budgets in April. These budgets called for some tax increases, layoffs of workers (mostly teachers) and sharp reductions in school programs. The voters rejected this because they want to keep the programs, retain the employees, hold the line on taxes and balance the budget.
